All districts are responsible for carrying out four standard functions: membership, fund development, program, and unit service. The district committee meets monthly to decide how to best meet the needs of the district and accomplish its goals in these areas.

# What does the District Committee do?

The **membership subcommittee** strives for growth through the organization of new Scouting units and growth through new members joining existing units.

The **fund development subcommittee** sees that the district provides its share of funds to the total council operating budget through Friends of Scouting, special events, and the spring and fall product sales.


The **program subcommittee** helps units with camp promotion, special activities, community service, training, and youth advancement and recognition.

The unit service subcommittee (commissioners) provides direct coaching and consultation to units to help ensure their success.

The membership, fund development, and program functions are carried out by members of the district committee. The unit service function is carried out by the district commissioner staff.

We are looking for more great leaders to join the district committee and serve as unit commissioners.

If you are interested in joining the committee or serving as a unit commissioner, please reach out to Amy.




First, we'd like to talk about resources and where to find them.

- Support: FOS, fundraising events like sporting clays, golf outings, Golden Eagle, etc.




Clicking on the Resources Tab will bring you to this page. Here you will find all kinds of different resources to utilize this fall (and all year long) for recruitment! The digital copies of the Recruitment Guidebooks, helpful tips for using social media, videos (BSA Brand Center website is a great resource to use), different methods for recruitment, resources to use at your recruitment events like coloring pages, station signs for join events, and more.



The district representative that attends your Join Night will also have extra materials if you need them.




Each year, the Cub Scout and Scouts BSA Recruitment Guidebooks are updated. These are a great tool for helping you plan your fall recruitment efforts.



Flyers & Posters can be printed to hand out at school open houses. If your school allows flyers, get your Join Night information to Amy ASAP. If the school allows a school talk, half sheet flyers & stickers can be handed out again then as well as a reminder.

Post Cards are also available. These should be used for hand-written invitations to join your unit. Have your Scouts think of 3-5 friends that they want to ask to join your unit. Peer-to-peer cards are business card size and can be used as invitations as well. You can hand write your unit's information on the back or print the information on mailing labels and stick them to the back of the cards. Have your Scouts write **their** name on the cards they give out to their friends with some kind of incentive for whatever new Scouts bring the card back with their name - ice cream, a little trinket – something they would find special.


Yard-Signs are a great way to promote your unit. Have each family put a sign in their yard August-October (or as long as they are willing!) to promote your unit. This year's yard signs have a QR code that will bring people to BeAScout.org where they can search for a unit near them. There is still some space at the bottom to write your own information as well. Ask friends that own a business, the local gas station, your charter org, etc. if you can put a sign in their yard, too. Your school may allow you to put yard signs in as well!



Your Unit Pin is very important! It allows people to find Scouting Units near them. The QR codes on yard signs and other Join Scouting signs/materials lead to BeAScout. Make sure your Pin is up to date with correct contact information so prospective families can find you. On the left is what it looks like in My.Scouting to set up your unit pin. On the right is what the pin looks like on the BeAScout website.

The QR code/link on the left will show you how to update your unit pin.

The QR code/link on the right will take you to video tutorials that show you how to use the invitation and application manager in My. Scouting so your unit can manage leads from BeAScout and can review and take action on online applications.

## Recruitment Timeline

### First: School Open House/Registration

- Ask school if your unit can set up a table.
- Promote your Join Night & display 2-3 projects or activities.
- If possible, have someone from your unit available to answer questions. Packs, ask a Troop to help if needed!

### **Second: School Talks**

- A School Talk is a 3-5 minute, high-energy, talk to potential members about Scouting.
- Presentations can take place at schools, community centers, churches, or other youthserving organizations.
- Let Amy know if someone from your unit is interested in doing a school talk.


Check out the sample talks from Scouts, Jada and Daegan.

An email was sent out to each unit's committee with a few questions about some activities your Pack has coming up so that when Amy or a volunteer is doing a school talk, they can share information specific to your unit to help get prospective members excited.

### Third: Join Night – Select date by September 1st

- Keep it simple & fun about 45 minutes (<u>no longer</u> than 1 hour)
- Remember, this is NOT a Pack meeting. The whole
   Pack does not have to be in attendance.
- Wear unit shirts with a name tag and your position with the unit.
- Share unit calendar & contact list. Do you have a welcome packet for new families?
- Share why <u>you</u> love Scouting and explain values and safety.
- ASK families to join your unit & explain how to do so.
- Have physical applications available or computers for BeAScout.
- Review applications and collect registration fees.





Typically, a Join Scouting event is like an open house, where families visit your unit to see what the Cub Scout program is all about. These are usually done at the school from which you are recruiting; however, if this is not possible, the location where your Pack typically meets will work, too. Not everyone from your unit needs to attend your join night, but make sure you have enough people to help run stations and answer questions. We recommend wearing Class Bs or your unit shirts.

The 5-Station Event: This method works best when expecting a smaller audience and have enough adult leaders to help or have a drop in Join Night. We recommend setting up an activities tables where Den Leaders can lead kids through an activity, like making slime or running old derby cars on a track. The possibilities are endless and are a great way to show the kids what FUN they will have in Scouting and will give parents the chance to move through the 5 Stations easily. Table tents are available online in Recruiting Resources and more information about each station can be found in the Recruitment Guidebooks.

The Presentation Method: Give a brief presentation to everyone in attendance. If possible, have a short, fun activity planned for the kids while the parents listen to the presentation. This works well if you have a large turnout and would have a hard time getting everyone through the stations.

The most important thing is to make sure families feel welcome and excited about Scouting! A sheet with some sample ideas for quick activities to do with the kids while their parents hear about Scouting is in your folder.



Fourth: Second Chance Night – Select date by October 1<sup>st</sup>

- For families who could not attend the Join Night.
- This can take place at the first Pack meeting after your Join Night.
- Have a designated volunteer ready to welcome new families and explain Scouting.

### **FOLLOW UP!**

- Follow up with the families that have attended meetings or other activities but have not signed up. Invite them to join your unit again.
- Check My.Scouting regularly for new leads or applications.

If possible, we will try to send flyers home again through the school to promote your second chance night.

Bring a Friend Activities are another great option for recruitment this fall for all units.



The New Parent Orientation Meeting is held separately from the *Join Scouting* event. It is facilitated by the Cubmaster, Committee Chair and New Member Coordinator. This is a chance for unit leaders to speak directly to parents and new leaders about:

- How the Pack operates and is funded
- How Advancement works
- Unit fundraising efforts
- Volunteer opportunities
- Introduce parents to Den Leaders
- Explain adult training opportunities
- Invite new leaders to next Roundtable to meet other leaders and learn more about Scouting



Registration assistance is still available for families. Scouting is an investment in our kids.

# New Membership Fees – Why change?

- Enhanced Criminal Background check processes and investments in Youth protection and safety programs are being implemented.
- General Liability Insurance costs to protect volunteer leaders, staff, charter organizations, units, and youth.
- BSA restructuring costs.

The national membership fee helps cover the cost of essential services to the local council and units. Services include expanded liability insurance for those participating in approved Scouting activities, enhanced criminal background checks, a variety of program resources, youth protection and leader-specific training, and the development of national, council, and unit programs. The BSA will continue to look at the membership fee structure and how we deliver the Scouting program.
